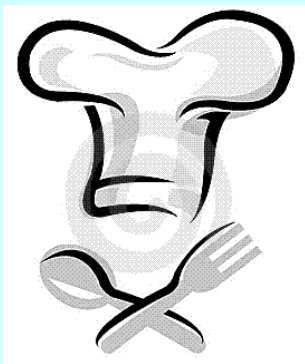

Gamodubu

On the 18 of June many Westwoodians gathered at the school parking lot as they got ready to depart to Gamodubu. The main group which travelled together arrived at 10:50. It was a 40 minute drive to Gamodubu. The first sight that we got was of children happily playing on the playground and older boys playing soccer. Elderly women were preparing breakfast and others were babysitting the younger orphans. At 11:00 Mrs. Phyllis Hildebrandt, head of Westwood, IB's and other parents started to unpack a pickup with a lot of donated clothes, food etc. Later two more trailers arrived which also transported donated items. The children then assembled and started the introductions with a song. While the introductions were going on, the Westwood Bus arrived with many Westwood children and the "Re Ba Bona Ha" coaches at around 11:05. At 11:10, after a song had been sung, a man came up to say a prayer. While the introductions were still on-going, I decided to go look at what was going on at the playground. Many of the younger Westwood children were having fun on the playground and two Gamodubu orphans were attempting to play soccer. While I was looking at the rest of the vegetable plots, Mrs. Wilson went up to say a few words and was soon followed by Mrs. Mokokwe. I only later found out that plants and vegetables had also been donated for the vegetable garden.

Finally, after about 20 minutes of introduction, 4 activities were launched - Soccer Practice with "Re Ba Bona Ha" coaches and IB boys (Daniel, Jaco, and Thomas); brick making with other IB boys; cultivation of the vegetable garden with IB and IG Girls and Baby care. All children had to wash their hands before eating for Hygiene reasons. But most of the older children didn't even eat as they wanted to get started straight away with the soccer practice. So the soccer practice got on the way at 11:25 with the coaches having some problems as there was a ratio of 1 coach to 15 players. All the other activities started at 11:30 and all Westwood visitors were busy helping in some way or the other. It was a enjoyable experience and we hope that Westwood can organize events of this nature more frequently!

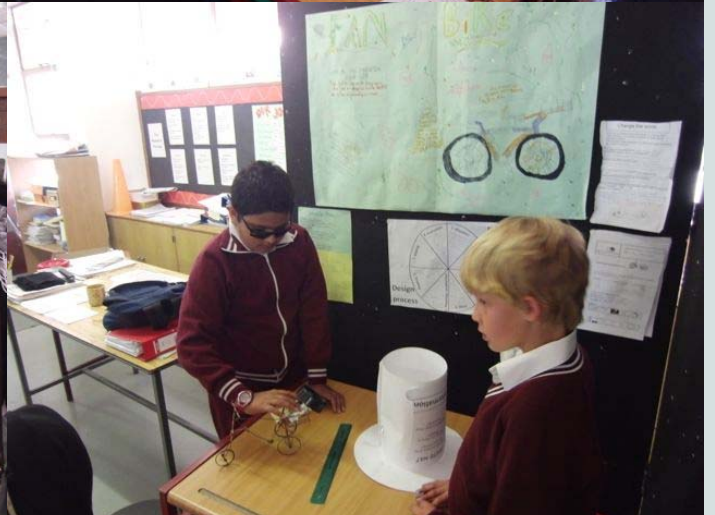

IB DIPLOMA NEWS



Creativity, Action and Service (CAS)

“Never doubt that a small group of thoughtful, committed citizens can change the world; indeed, it’s the only thing that ever has.”

Margaret Mead

This term has been a very exciting and busy term for many of our Diploma students. For those who are not aware CAS is one of the three essential elements of the Diploma Programme. It involves students in a range of activities alongside their academic studies and provides students with the benefits of experiential learning.

The three strands of CAS are Creativity, Action and Service:

- Creativity is interpreted broadly to cover a wide range of arts and other activities and includes creativity by the individual student in designing and carrying out service projects.
- Action can include participation in expeditions, individual and team sports and physical training; it can also include carrying out creative and service projects.
- Service encompasses community and social service, as well as environmental projects. Students are encouraged to think globally, act locally when carrying out service projects.

The main form of assessment for CAS is self-assessment by means of ongoing reflections. A few of the Diploma students have agreed to share the following:

Creativity

“I enjoyed having Cello lessons the most this term. Although I only got the music sheets for my exam about a week before I was able to push myself in order to learn the selected music pieces. All of the concerts that I went to required me to play with others (duet) and I have to be committed to practising every day. Usually the concerts I play in also donate the money from the tickets to charity groups.” **Stephanie Tsalwa**

“I really enjoyed Zumba as this was something completely new for me. Not only am I able to learn a variety of different Latin-American dancing but it also gave me inspiration for my CAS project. I developed new skills as well as creating awareness of my personal strengths.” **Tanja Lazic**

“The guitar/band club to me was the most fun activity to do. It was lots of fun working together with other people. I improved my guitar playing skills. I also played drums and enjoyed working towards a goal which was a concert.” **Lloyd Katzke**

Action

“The activity I enjoyed the most so far this year would be training for the Kyalami Easter festival Horse show in May. I enjoyed it the most because it was my first horse show at a higher level of competition and I did very well. It was a great experience as I learnt new skills and had a new competition as it was my first time. I learnt more advanced techniques and I was able to represent Botswana. I learnt how to support a team.”

Leah Sampson

“I enjoyed the Juilliard Master Classes and production-work the most this term. I was able to see what my strengths, weaknesses and limitation are. I also learned that I was fully committed and I pushed myself to learn something if I was unable to do it the first time. The hours were long and sometimes stressful which gave me an idea of what it means to be a dancer full-time and still keep up with homework. I was always on time and made it to every lesson/class to avoid any problems. I made many new friends because there was no one I knew at the classes. We all got along and worked well together.”

Service

“The activity I have enjoyed the most was volunteering at the Old Naledi soup kitchen. I participated in a fellow student’s CAS activity and we provided soup, bread rolls and apples to the children of Old Naledi. Not only did I enjoy spending time with the children, but it was definitely beneficial to the children who were able to have multiple cups of soup on a rainy morning – there was also a lot of left over which they were able to take home to their families. By being outside our usual sphere and visiting Old Naledi Village I was able to extend my awareness of the community and issues being faced such as poverty. It was a new challenge and I have signed up to participate in the activity every time that it runs.” **Maddison Wong**

Many students have either completed or begun their CAS project this term. The requirements for the CAS project are that it is of significant duration, it encompasses two of the three elements of CAS, students work collaboratively and they address issues of Global Importance. Fabian was awarded a certificate by the Blood Donation Society for the excellent work he put into organising the first Blood Donation day at Westwood, there will be another Blood Donation day early next term. Janine has arranged sponsorship for a soup kitchen in Old Naledi which takes place once a month on a Sunday. She and some of her peers organise the making of the soup and spend time playing and interacting with the children at the centre. Samuel has spent a number of Saturdays at Gamodubu with some of the IB2 students teaching the children of Gamodubu how to make bricks. Samuel will now hand over this project to Naduni who hopes to take it to the next stage. Thomas has been working with the social worker at Gamodubu to create a detailed register of all the children who visit the centre. The queue for photographs for the register was never ending as the children were so delighted to have their photo taken they kept rejoining the queue. It was really rewarding to watch our students interact with the children of Gamodubu. Daniel, Jaco and more recently Thomas have been assisting the ReBaBonaHa coaches with the coaching of football on a Saturday morning. Jaco and Daniel assisted in getting the programme off the ground by sourcing equipment and promoting the programme amongst the local community. Thanks to Evan and Ethan families were able to enjoy a well organised ride through Mokolodi in aid of the Rhino’s. Stefan and Naduni initiated and planned the Adventure Club activities, Mrs Holden and I enjoyed our Friday afternoons with the Adventure Club, especially the canoeing at the yacht club which we hope to do more of next term. Eight of our students have begun learning sign language, they will complete the course next term and will be visiting the School for the Deaf. Mrs Brook has kindly been teaching our girls to do quilting and over the course of the holiday Megan, Neetika and Gorata will be quilting with some of the teenage girls at Gamodubu. Aleksa has managed to form a Westwood Band; practices had to be split into two sessions in order to accommodate all the guitarists. Competitiveness was taken to a new level at social hockey, we almost had to abandon a few games in the interest of safety to the players (we have a broken hockey stick as evidence).

These are just a sample of the projects and activities that have taken place this term and there are a number of projects planned for next term. We thank you for the support that you have given our students and look forward to your continued support in the future. 1. Applications to SA Universities

Applications for undergraduate academic programmes, other than the Sciences close on **30 September, 2011** for South African students, and on **31 August** for international students.

Restriction on student numbers

Owing to constraints on the facilities of the University, the intake of students in **all** the degree programmes is limited. It may even be the case that available places are full long before the closing date. Please note that meeting the minimum requirements of a degree programme, does not guarantee your admission.

Applications to Oxbridge: 15 October deadline

FYI: A typical application process (Source: University of Wits website.)

SELECTION TESTS

WHAT ARE THE NBT TESTS? (Now required by most faculties in all SA Unis.)

The tests were designed to measure students' levels of proficiency in Academic Literacy, Quantitative Literacy and Mathematics. There are two tests of three hours each. The first test is the *Academic and Quantitative Literacy* test (AQL) which is written by **ALL** applicants for all programmes in Health Sciences. The second test is the Mathematics test also known as the *Cognitive Academic Mathematical Proficiency* (CAMP) test.

The test results will be used in addition to the matric results and other admission criteria.. You are required to write one test only, irrespective of the number of universities you have applied to. A fee is charged for the test.

Closing dates for applications 31 August 2011

Your application

You may apply for three programmes (degrees).

- If you apply for two programmes in Health Sciences, you are advised to apply for one programme in a less restricted faculty (eg Humanities, Commerce and Law, or Science). We strongly advise you to apply for more than one programme – keep your options open!
- Applicants to Wits must enclose a non-refundable application. Pay by cheque, bank draft or postal order.

Your name must be written on the back.

- **Documentation**

If you have not yet matriculated –

- The Grade 11 report (see application form) must be signed and stamped by your school principal.
- International applicants should submit a certified copy of a recent school report. If you have already matriculated (even if you are rewriting some subjects in 2011) but have not attended any university –
- Obtain a certificate from the Matriculation Board when you receive your matric results and submit this certificate to SEnC urgently.

You will receive acknowledgement of receipt of your application.

The acknowledgement letter contains your application number which becomes your person / student number on enrolment. Quote this number every time you contact Wits.

Each choice of programme is treated as a separate application. A letter will be sent to you once a decision is made on any one of your choices. The letter gives you further instructions (eg pay a deposit to secure the offer of a place, or attend an interview, or write a selection test).

Matriculants: Wits will get your matric results directly from the relevant Department of Education.

You may be made a provisional offer (depending on your Grade 11 results), or be invited to attend an interview or a selection test.

Some faculties will make you a provisional offer on the basis of your Grade 11 report. No offer can be confirmed until your matric results are received. (You may accept any provisional offer without jeopardising any of your other selections.)

Changed your mind about your choice of study?

Let SEnC know in writing what your new selection is (do not submit a new application form).

NB: Check with SEnC to make sure applications are still open for your new selection.

Let SEnC know straight away if your contact details change.

Successful applicants receive a letter offering a firm place, information about the registration and orientation programme.

Firm offer letters are sent once matric results are available (December or early January) or earlier if you have already matriculated.

Reply to firm-place letter to let us know whether you are coming to Wits.
